

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

AWAH's Annual Literary Celebration

or the second consecutive year, American Women of African Heritage, Inc. (AWAH) hosted a Literary Celebration on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. The event showcased three African American authors whose dynamic narratives contribute to our rich history and culture.

Benilde Little, bestselling author of novels Good Hair, The Itch, Acting Out, Who Does She Think She Is? and Welcome To My Breakdown. The latter, her latest publication, is the book she presented and is her first non-fiction. Paula Williams Madison is the author of a memoir, Finding Samuel Lowe: China, Jamaica, Harlem, which details her discovery and reconnection with her Chinese family. Quincy Mills is the author of Cutting Along the Color Line: Black Barbers and Barber Shops in America which chronicles the lives and labors of black barbers and their shops

throughout the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. He is currently working on a second book tentatively entitled, The Wages of Resistance: Financing the Black Freedom movement.

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An enthusiastic audience attended the event, held at the John Jay Heritage Center in Rye, NY, and took part in a lively Q&A session with the authors following their presentations. Westchester luminary, Barbara Edwards, served as mistress-ofceremonies.

The Literary Celebration is one of the programs sponsored by AWAH, a notfor-profit organization, where part of its mission is to empower women and girls, celebrate African American culture and promote understanding among diverse peoples. Francine Shorts is president of AWAH. Gwen Cort and Eddie Mae Barnes co-chaired the Literary Celebration event.

Programs 2016

O.R.A.L.S. (Oral Reading and Listening/Learning Skills) had a consistent group of about fourteen 4th and 5th grade students attending weekly sessions at The Thomas H. Slater Center after school program in White Plains. The students were challenged to learn map and vocabulary skills and were introduced to African American inventors. In addition to learning poems written by the more familiar Langston Hughes and Dr. Maya Angelou, students were introduced by AWAH volunteers to the less familiar poets: David Mandessi Diop and Lolita Cuevas.

We were so impressed and proud when one of our 4th graders, Jhonley, was inspired to write his own poem, "My

Home, My Home". It was to be cherished. His writing encouraged another student to write a poem dedicated to her late grandfather whom she had never met.

At the end-of-year reception for the students and parents, AWAH contributed to the menu. Each student received a U.S. poster map and a U.S. bingo game as gifts.

Our Knit Pics program was on hiatus and will resume in the Fall 2016.

For the eighth consecutive year, AWAH presented its Second Chance Award to a Westchester Community College student at a ceremony attended by a capacity audience. This annual scholarship is awarded to a female student who, after a break in her schooling, is returning to college. The Second Chance Award supports AWAH's mission to empower women and girls of African ancestry. The 2015-2016 Second Chance Award went to Trameeka MacDonald who, enrolled as a student of Liberal Arts-Behavioral Sciences, plans to pursue a career in Psychology and Human Services.

The Awards Ceremony, always a celebratory occasion, was well attended by students, parents, and donors. Members of AWAH, including Toni Cox-Burns, President Emerita, presented the award.
